SIR FRANKLYN WILSON, KCMG (London)

For services to business and philanthropy

Having started an accounting firm in 1971 and having served as the Managing Partner of Deloitte & Touche, Bahamas to 1994, Mr. Wilson's current business interests include Chairman of Sunshine Holdings Ltd., Focol Holdings Ltd., Arawak Homes Ltd., Sunshine Insurance (Agents & Brokers), Royal Star Assurance Ltd., Sunshine Finance Ltd., and Cotton Bay Developers Ltd.

His other activities include membership of the Board of Advisors to the president of Dalhousie University in Halifax, Nova Scotia, his alma mater. In 1972, Mr. Wilson was elected to Parliament; one of the youngest persons to have ever been elected. He has served as chairman of the Council of the College of The Bahamas, which has commenced plans to operate the Franklyn Wilson Graduate School of Business and as the founding chairman of each of The Bahamas

Chapter of the Young Presidents' Organization (YPO) and the World Presidents' Organization (WPO). Mr. Wilson was the founding chairman of Junior Achievement Bahamas and, for almost ten years, served as a director of Junior Achievement Worldwide; and as a trustee of Elmira College at Elmira, New York.

Mr. Wilson has been honoured by the Bahamas Chamber of Commerce as its Distinguished Citizen and almost 30 years later with the Chamber's Lifetime Achievement Award. Several national trade unions, including the country's largest, have honoured him for his role in the advancement of the overall labour movement. Forty years after being one of twelve incorporators of the Bahamas Institute of Chartered Accounts, he received that organization's Lifetime Achievement Award. He is the "chairman emeritus of YPO. He has received a Lifetime Achievement Award from St. Barnabas Anglican Church, and has been awarded a Global Trumpet Award by the Trumpet Foundation based in Atlanta, Georgia, USA.

His wife, an attorney by profession, serves as president of the Senate of The Bahamas and the couple has three adult children and ten grandchildren.

SIR EDWARD CHARLES CARTER, KCMG (London)

For services to broadcasting and the media

Edward Charles Carter is the eldest of eight children and grew up with his parents on Augusta Street in Bain Town, Nassau. His father, the late Harcourt Carter, owned a number of music stores, so the entire family grew up appreciating Bahamian music.

Charles Carter attended many schools: St. John's College in Nassau; he studied business administration at New York University; broadcast administration at Ryerson University in Toronto, Canada and public administration at the University of Manchester in England. Mr. Carter's career has been in broadcasting and he is a former General Manager of ZNS Television. He became widely known for the creation of programmes based on Bahamian Culture, namely, "The Young Bahamian Show" and the Bahamians series, "These Are Bahamians," which is heard every Saturday morning at 8:30 on 1540 AM and Saturday evening at 6 on 102.9 Island FM.

Mr. Carter was a former Member of Parliament for the Holy Cross Constituency and held ministerial posts in Foreign Affairs and Health.

THE HONOURABLE DAME ANITA MILDRED ALLEN, DBE (LONDON)

For services to the Bahamas Court of Appeal and Judiciary

Dame Anita Allen née Bethell was born on New Providence on 21 December 1947. She attended the Western Junior and Senior Schools and Government High School.

Dame Anita was admitted to the Bar of England and Wales by the Honourable Society of Grays Inn in July 1973 and later admitted to the Bahamas Bar the same year. In 1974, she married Algernon Allen Sr. and they have five children.

Her strong desire to serve her country led her to join the Attorney General's Office, where she remained for thirteen years. She left for private practice in October 1986 and there she remained for ten years.

In 1996, she was elevated to the Supreme Court bench where she served with distinction on all sides of the court but particularly in the Criminal Division, where she spent most of her judicial career.

In 2010, she was appointed president of the Court of Appeal. Dame Anita is known as a fearless and courageous judge, striving always to administer justice in accordance with the highest judicial standards of impartiality, independence, accountability and fairness. She lives the maxim that justice must not only be done but must manifestly be seen to be done.

Although her profession is profoundly rewarding, she cherishes and is most proud of her roles as wife, mother and now grandmother. Despite her very demanding career, she is proud of her enduring marriage of 41 years and her phenomenal and highly successful children.

As is evident from her life, Dame Anita is passionate about her country and loves young people. She grasps every opportunity she can to inform the youth of The Bahamas of the role of the Court of Appeal and of their obligations as citizens. She uses the Court of Appeal's education outreach programme to inspire, motivate and encourage all to be good citizens of The Bahamas.

MR. WILLIAM ALFRED MCCARTNEY, CMG, DD,

For services to the Brethren denomination and entrepreneurship

William Alfred McCartney Sr. was the first child born to Alfred Arnold McCartney and Addie Del née Allen McCartney in February 1926 in the picturesque settlement of Tarpum Bay, Eleuthera. He was affectionately called "Al". At age six the family relocated to New Providence in the area of Fort Fincastle, then to McCartney Lane off Wulff Road.

The 1980s brought new investment experiences with the establishment of Wilcha Limited and the construction of a 38-apartment complex in the Cable Beach area. During this time Al also partnered with a son and nephew to develop the subdivision called Bahamia West.

He also established Commonwealth Fashion Centre Ltd. (Commonwealth Fabrics). A devoted Christian, Al has attended East Street Gospel Chapel for decades and has served as elder, Sunday school teacher, choir director, preacher and counsellor. Many church projects have been established with Al's participation and leadership: Blue Hill Gospel Chapel, Believer's Gospel Chapel, and the Christian Life Centre on John F. Kennedy Drive. Al is currently serving as the vice president of the Assemblies of the Brethren in The Bahamas, after serving for twelve years president.

Al was married to Eliza Eileen McCartney née Culmer for 60 years until her passing in 2011. They were the proud parents of five very accomplished children; William (Billy), Dr. Barrette, Lennox and Keith McCartney and Tamara (Tammy) McCartney-Cargill. Al is loved and highly respected among Bahamians. Many have been trained in body repair work and other auto part skills by him and are thankful to him for his vigorous "do it right the first time" attitude.

LEONARD AUDLEY JOHNSON, CMG, DMin, JP (London)

For services to the church

Born on of New Providence, Dr. Leonard Johnson pursued higher education at West Indies College (now Northern Caribbean University), graduating with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Theology in 1981 and a Master of Arts degree in Religion in 1990. Four years later, he earned the Doctor of Ministry degree from the Reformed Theological Seminary. In 2005, Sojourner-Douglass awarded him the honorary degree Doctor of Humane Letters.

During his more than 30 years in ministry, Dr. Johnson has served the Adventist Church in The Bahamas and the Cayman Islands as a church pastor and a departmental Director for Youth ministries, communication, and ministerial as well as the Spirit of Prophecy coordinator. In addition to being a pastor and departmental director, he also served the church in The Bahamas as the executive secretary (1999-2003) and the president (2003-2010) of the Bahamas Conference of Seventh-day Adventists (now South Bahamas Conference of Seventh-day Adventists).

Among his contributions to the Bahamian community is his service on the Airport Authority and Nassau Airport Development boards for three years.

Dr. Johnson is the author of two books and scores of articles published in magazines such as *Priority, Ministry* (Spanish edition), and *The Message*. He has conducted seminars and participated in training up to the doctoral level for the Inter-American Division Theological Seminary and the Euro-Asia Division, in particular Ukraine and Moscow. His numerous preaching assignments have taken him to the United States, London, Italy, Moscow, Ukraine, the Caribbean, and Central America.

Dr. Johnson loves to write, operate computers, travel, read, and spend time with family. He is married to his special friend, Denise Cooper, a Registered Nurse and Guidance Counsellor. They have two adult children, Larnelle and Darnell; a daughter-in-law, Ivy; and a grandson, Ike.

MR. JAMES JULIUS CATALYN, OBE

For services to culture and drama

James Julius Catalyn began writing poetry when he was about sixteen years of age. Many of his early poems leaned toward the topic of love. For many years he kept his collection private, only letting those near and dear to him (including the late Meta Davis Cumberbatch) read them. It wasn't until December 1979, at the insistence of his dear, lifelong friend, Louis Walter Archer Hanchell, that he took courage and published his first collection of poetry, Expressing Myself. This collection he dedicated to his mother, Theresa Elizabeth Major. Louis was given the distinct honour of writing the foreword to that first publication.

James Catalyn is an accomplished playwright, poet, satirist, lyricist, actor, and comedian, among many other attributes. He penned the book and lyrics for the hit Bahamian musical,

"Guanahani" - for which Andrew R. Curry I wrote the music and several other pieces.

He is a strong believer in and an advocate of things Bahamian. His works in glorifying the Bahamian dialect are legendary. Through his efforts, he has brought national acceptance to "Bahamianese", the name he gave the Bahamian dialect in the mid 1970s. He also coined the expressions, "Laughin' at we sef" and "Guard our heritage! Speak Bahamianese! Use English only when necessary!"

He was recognized as a Cultural Icon and named among the 41 Cultural Warriors of The Bahamas in celebration of

the Bahamas' 41st anniversary of Independence, 10 July 2014.

Mr. Catalyn is the recipient of several local and international awards. He was the creator of the International Cultural Weekend and served as chairman of the International Cultural Committee of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs for 14 years. He served as a director of the Hotel Corporation of The Bahamas and is founder and President of the Bahamas' premier performing troupe, "James Catalyn & Friends".

He currently serves as chairman of the national HIV/AIDS Resource Committee.

For his services to culture and drama on the recommendation of the Government of The Commonwealth of The Bahamas Her Majesty the Queen has awarded him the honour of Officer of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire (Civil Division).

REV. DR. PHILIP ARTHUR RAHMING, OBE, JP For civic services and religion

A graduate of Calbar Theological College, Kingston, Jamaica, Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, Kentucky, and United Theological Seminary, Dayton Ohio. Dr. Rahming began his schooling at Sandilands Public School in Fox Hill, his hometown. As a boy, Philip always had a love for service and determined to become outstanding in something.

Nurtured in a Baptist Sunday school where his grandfather was the superintendent, young Rahming learnt that God gave special gifts to individuals and that each person has a particular contribution to make in life. As an adult Rev. Dr. Rahming became president of the Bahamas Christian Council and served for six years. Later he became a member of the Ethics Commission of the Baptist World Alliance (BWA).

A former Secondary School Teacher, retired College of the Bahamas Lecturer, and past Chaplain to the Honourable Speaker of the Bahamas Parliament. Dr. Rahming is currently vice president-at-large of the Bahamas National Baptist Missionary and Educational Convention, a commission member on Baptist doctrine and inter-church co-operation of the BWA, and Pastor of Rehoboth Ministries. Rev. Rahming is a Justice of the Peace.

CLEOPHAS R. E. ADDERLEY, OBE

Mr. Adderley is the eighth of nine children born to the late Cleophas E. Adderley (former Member of Parliament for the City of Nassau) and the late Mrs. Helen L. Adderley née Bailey (daughter of the late R. M. Bailey, for whom a public high school is named).

Mr. Adderley is an Attorney-At-Law, founder and director of the Bahamas National Youth, Choir, director of the Senior Choir of The Parish Church of The Most Holy Trinity, founder and director of The National Choir of The Bahamas, former Director of Culture and the Executive Director of National Musical Heritage and Research at the Ministry of Youth, Sports and Culture.



He studied piano and organ with his aunts, the late Rosalie and Gladys Bailey respectively, and piano with the late Marion St. George, E. Clement Bethel and Godfrey Davis. He studied organ with Douglas Potts and the late John Gittens. He studied voice with Dawn–Marie Nash (Virtue) and the late Pauline Glasby and participated in master classes with internationally acclaimed opera diva Gloria Davey at the University of Indiana at Bloomington, and opera divo Simon Estes. He studied orchestration as a private student of Nancy Petterson–Strelau at the University of Miami and orchestral conducting as a private student of Harold Glickman, New York City.

Mr. Adderley is the composer of the first Bahamian grand opera "Our Boys". He is also the composer of the first Bahamian concert mass, "Missa Caribe". He is the composer of music and rhythms for the play "You Can Lead a Horse to Water" by Winston Saunders. He has written and arranged music for piano, pipe organ, choir and solo voice. Some of his choral compositions have been published by Hal Leonard Corporation, the largest publisher of choral music in the United States.

As Director of the Bahamas National Youth Choir he has taken the singers to twenty-five countries on four continents, including Mexico, Germany, Italy, China, United States of America, Finland, South Africa and Swaziland. They have sung in twenty-five languages, before royalty, heads of state and internationally acclaimed celebrities, at some of the most notable venues including The John F. Kennedy Center for The Performing Arts, Weill Recital Hall at Carnigie Hall, Beijing Symphony and the Poly Theatre, Notre Dame Cathedral and Saint Peter's Basilica.

Mr. Adderley has produced ten commercial compact discs of choral music. He conceived, composed and produced music for the cultural shows for the opening ceremonies of the 1995 and 1998 Bahamas Games and the official opening of the new Thomas A. Robinson Stadium in 2012, and was the co-producer of the national cultural show for the 40th anniversary of the Bahamian independence held at Clifford Park in 2013. He is a founding board member of the National Art Gallery of The Bahamas, a founding board member of the Antiquities, Monuments and Museums Board, a former member of The National Cultural Heritage Commission, a former president of The Bahamian Students Association (The University of the West Indies, Mona Campus), a former president of The Nassau Music Society, a trustee of the Cultural Arts Foundation and a member of the Harry C. Moore Memorial Scholarship in the Arts Committee.

He is married to Francoise Brooks-Adderley and is the father of two children.

MRS. TELATOR STRACHAN, OBE

For services to craft and entrepreneurship

Mrs. Telator Cumi Strachan née Moxey was born in New Providence. She received her early education at St. Agnes Day School, Woodcock School and Western Junior and Senior Schools. She also pursued courses in shorthand, typing and English.

An avid Baptist, Telator is a founding member of the Judaea Baptist Church where Rev. Dr. Marina P. Sands is the pastor. She is also a licensed minister and a member of the Trustee Board.



Inspired by friends in the straw industry and by her mother, the late Deaconess Mother Pearl L. Moxey, a talented straw vendor and seamstress, Mrs. Strachan joined the ranks of persons employed in the largest cottage industry in The Bahamas in 1955. Through self- training she designed, manufactured and marketed two types of tourist gift items – the straw work and the seven-way sun dress designed by the matriarchs in her family, as well as shirts.

In 1968, Mrs. Strachan became the president of the Straw Vendors' Association where she organized the women in self-help projects and in promoting the industry. Telator was also instrumental in the formation of the New Providence Handicraft Cooperative Society, an organization to promote the local straw work through interaction with suppliers of raw material and straw items in the Family Islands, as well as to facilitate wholesale export.

Telator Cumi Strachan also served as a goodwill ambassador for The Bahamas, travelling throughout the United States, Canada, Europe and the Caribbean with the Ministry of Tourism, promoting straw handicraft and The Bahamas as the number-one destination for vacations.

The continuity of the straw industry has always been a pet project of Mrs. Strachan's, who has presented many lectures at various schools, including the College of The Bahamas, and participated in many seminars and conferences on the history and development of the straw industry.

One of the highpoints of Mrs. Strachan's career was her appointment to the Senate in 198. She was the first straw vendor to serve in this capacity and later became part of the first mother- daughter team to serve in either house of Parliament when her daughter was appointed a Senator in 1999.

Her civic achievements include serving on the Town Planning Committee of the Ministry of Works, the Cooperative Advisory Council of the Ministry of Agriculture, the Tourism Advisory Committee of the Ministry of Tourism, the Women's Advisory Council of the Ministry of Social Services and Community Development, member of the Nassau Tourism Development Board, member of the Business and Professional Women's Association, a charter member of the Over-the-Hill Reunion Group and the Social Security Commission of the Ministry of Housing and National Insurance.

Mrs. Strachan is the mother of three children, granddaughter, Celine, and one son in-law. The quintessential example of the strong Bahamian woman, Mrs. Strachan is a woman of deep faith and belief in God. Her motto is, "If I could help somebody as I pass along, my living will not be in vain."

MR. THOMAS A. BASDEN, MBE

For services in business and commerce

Thomas Arnold Basden was born on the island of North Caicos in the Turks and Caicos Islands in 1934. His mother, Anna Casandra Grant, was employed in the household of Norman and Jane Quant-Basden, parents of Arnold Basden, the father of Thomas Basden. At a young age, Thomas migrated to The Bahamas with his mother and established residency in Bain Town, New Providence. His mother enrolled him in Our Lady's Roman Catholic School on Deveaux Street. He was taught by the Sisters of Charity and joined the Roman Catholic marching band, where he studied music under the direction of Roman Catholic Priest, Father Alban.

Thomas was only able to receive a sixth grade education before joining the workforce to assist his mother with finances. During the course of his development, he practiced many different trades and rose to be a carpenter foreman for the English Construction Company, Higgs and Hill. He was one of the original members of the Bahamas Federation of Labour started by the late Sir Randel Fawkes.

In 1956, Thomas Arnold Basden married Mary Victoria Farah, the daughter of Domet and Birdie Farah of Arthurs Town, Cat Island. The union produced four sons: Gregory, Kevin, Lorne and Sean.

In 1958, using his talents developed in the Bahamas Federation of Labour, Thomas joined the Progressive Liberal Party and worked as a foot soldier in the struggle for the liberation of the masses and majority rule. From 1958 to present, Thomas Basden continues to be a working member of the Progressive Liberal Party.

In 1960, Mr. Basden began to work for Otis Elevator Company where he also had the opportunity to study electrical engineering through the Otis Educational Program. He rose to become the lead foreman for the installation and maintenance of Otis Elevators in The Bahamas.

In 1969, Thomas Basden incorporated Basden Elevator Company Limited, which remains the only wholly-owned Bahamian elevator company. Thomas Basden was its chief executive officer from 1969 to 2007 when he retired and turned the company over to three of his sons. The company has established itself in The Bahamas and Turks and Caicos Islands and is on the verge of third generation leadership.

His tenacity and strong moral principles have gained him respect in both his public and private life. He has served on many governmental boards over the many years. More notably, as the chairman of the Town Planning Committee from 2002 to 2007 and presently as a member of the Board of Directors of Bahamasair. He has been an astute businessman and an extraordinary developer. In 2011, he began the development of a special-projects resort on Rose Island in The Bahamas. The resort caters to clients requiring private island access with modern amenities and it is in its final stage of development.

Mr. Basden enjoys spending his leisure time with his children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren whether it be fishing, boating or relaxing on Rose Island.

MR. GEORGE GILBERT E. PINDER, MBE

For services in commerce and fishing

George Gilbert Esdale Pinder, better known as Gill, was born in Spanish Wells on the 12th June, 1952 to Mr. & Mrs. Leo R. Pinder. Gill attended Spanish Wells All Age School until the age of twelve, when he went to Munro College in Jamaica to receive further education. After spending two years at Munro, Gill returned to The Bahamas where he attended Queen's College in Nassau. After a year at Q.C., he decided to make a career at sea in the fishing industry which he did for about ten years.

He began working with his father at Ronald's Servicentre Ltd. becoming an Evinrude certified mechanic and refrigeration troubleshooter. He soon became general manager of the company. However, his passion was towards the fishing industry.

He continued moving the company forward while focusing more heavily on the seafood department. Eventually, he relinquished his other responsibilities at the company to concentrate on and manage Ronald's Seafood with a desire to improve the crawfish product. Mr. Pinder realized that crawfish (rock lobster) was a mainstay for the community of Spanish Wells and also a major export for The Bahamas, bringing in monies necessary for the island as well as the country.

Mr. Pinder has also been involved in other areas of the fishing industry, including serving on The Fisheries Advisory Committee for 25 years. He also has partnered with others over the years to buy fishing vessels, affording other fisherman the opportunity to earn a living from the sea. Gill has always been there to help the fishermen, and as a result has gained their respect and appreciation. Recently Gill was awarded the "Lifetime Achievement Award For Fisheries" by the JCN award committee.

Since 1979 Mr. Pinder began serving on the Town Planning Committee and the Local Government Town Council for the past nine years. Gill has also been involved in the development of our youth as well. He has helped out tremendously by donating to many youth related groups such as the Spanish Wells All Age School, Spanish Wells Community Band, Spanish Wells Sport Association and many others.

Also active in the real estate industry, Mr. Pinder has partnered with a few others to develop property on Russell Island including the Pelican Bay/Crystal Bay project.



MR. DENNIS HALL, MBE

For services to the community

Mr. Dennis "Preacher" Hall Sr. was the first of two children born to Ms. Alberta Musgrove and Mr. Walter Hall in Whitby, Turks and Caicos Islands in 1928.

He grew up with his grandparents and went to the all age school in Bottle Creek. In 1946, in search of a better life, at the tender age of 17 he migrated to New Providence.



In 1955, he and his family relocated to West End, Grand Bahama. There he ventured into tourism as a taxi-driver.

In those days, West End was an active community and many tourists visited West End because it had the only airport and the only hotel, the Jack Tar Hotel.
